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There have been a number of recent developments within ACE which will be of interest to everyone. Some of these will be reported elsewhere in this newsletter, so I will merely

highlight them here.

I am extremely pleased to report that not only was last November's conference 'artistic" success, as reported in the January issue of Acenotes, but it was also a success at the box office. Elliot Grieve reported at the last Board meeting that the Burnaby Conference Committee will be turning approximately \$3,000 over to ACE, as the net proceeds from the conference. Those of you who have been involved with ACE for some time know how vital revenue from the conference is to the successful operation of our Association, I know I speak for all of you when I congratulations thanks to everyone in Burnaby who worked to make the conference such a success, I was particularly pleased with the wide variety and number of new people who were attracted to the conference by its theme and format. It was an important step toward broadening the base of ACE - a major direction of this year's ACE Board.

Another important recent development regards the ACE Centre. We have been advised by the Burnaby School Board that they will likely require the facility for another purpose in the near future, and so our lease has not been renewed. but extended on a month-to-month basis. The ACE Board has agreed that we need to actively explore other options to house the resources of OUIT Association.

PRESIDENT'S CORNER

Preliminary suggestions include sharing a facility with one or more other organizations to share costs and allow for permanent staffing; or locating in a school with surplus space. Both these options have the advantage of giving the ACE Centre a "human presence" on a day-to-day basis, which has been an ongoing problem for us at the present location.

A recent incident exemplifies two aspects of this problem. The centre was broken into a couple of months ago, resulting in minor vandalism and theft. One of the items stolen was our telephone answering machine which, out of necessity, was our inadequate replacement for staff at the centre. Clearly, we need a better alternative. Suggestions from the membership would be most welcome!

Those of you phoning the centre these days won't get the answering machine because it isn't there. Instead you'll be greeted by the pleasant voice of one of our new project staff, whom you have read about on the cover of Acenotes, I want to acknowledge and thank Laurence Leader for spearheading the submission of trice Development proposal to Canada Employment. We are also grateful to Ralph LaRoux and the others at Canada Employment for their support of the work of our Association.

I was extremely pleased with the large number of well qualified candidates we were able to consider for the positions. We interviewed. some excellent people who we would have liked to hire in addition to the four excellent people we eventually selected. We welcome Candace Bishop back, who will provide continuity from the last project, this time Skills as and Communications Coordinator. Joanne Millard is already doing an

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excellent job as Project Manager. Zoe Hills has a solid background in library work, and appears off to a fast start cataloguing resources. Karen Kelly has already met with the Training Committee in Victoria, and should very well as Training Coordinator. I think you'll see creat results from this energetic and talented group, and I'm sure will provide them with Vou enthusiastic support in the ACE tradition if and when they call upon you for assistance.

Finally, as most of you know last November's Annual participative" General Meeting, your Board is attempting to create new mechanisms for increased membership participation irī planning and setting direction for ACE in the future. One such strategy is to have a General Meeting part-way through the year, in addition to the Annual General Meeting, to assess progress to date and make "mid-course" adjustments, so to speak. The notice and agenda for this meeting are elsewhere in this newsletter, I urge as many of you as possible to come out on May 2 for this important meeting. Several items related to the topics I have highlighted here Will Эe considered. We also want to modify the objectives of our Society in the constitution to bring them into line with the requirements for status as a charitable society. This will open several interesting fund-raising opportunities for us, and will not fundamentally alter the nature of our Association.

As you can see, we're in the middle of an exciting and significant year for ACE. Please join us on May 2 to help clarify and extend directions for your Board and sustain the vitality of your Association.

BORRO MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

On February 21, 1987 the meeting of the ACE Board established four working committees that discussed various recommendations on the areas of:

- Communications & Expansions
- Re-location of ACE Centre
- Training
- 1987 Conference

The recommendations of the Communications and Expansions Committee were:

- a) NEWSLETTER AND JOURNAL
- The ACE project staff will produce the newsletter and journal.
- 2) The newsletter will be used for a "mini-survey" of members to get feedback re: benefits of Community Education to their community.

b) VERNON PROJECT

- Maggie Larocque will investigate funding sources to hire staff for the purpose of designing a survey tool to be used in Vernon schools.
- 2) That ACE be available as a consulting body to the project perhaps for a fee?

c) COMMUNITY SCHOOL COUNCILS

f) That ACE look at models of existing Community Education Councils before this committee attempts to develop suggestions for encouraging development of same.

The recommendations of the Re-location of the ACE Centre Committee were:

- 1) An alliance with SPARC
- sharing office space,
 secretarial work, conferences.
 2) An alliance with PACE
- PACE does'nt currently have a space.

- 3) A space in Willingdon Hieghts School.
- 4) A space in a community school.
- 5) A new independent office/centre space.
- 6) A residential setting (rotating or permanent).
- 7) An ACE mobile with cellular phone and computer.

The Training Task Force met on March 11, 1987 to set directions and meet with the new Training Coordinator hired for the ACE project. Their recommendations were:


- 1) Revise training needs survey to be sent to ACE members with April newsletter.
- 2) Find members in the Lower Mainland to evaluate the revised ACE resource binder, and then promote the finished product.
- 3) Research other training resources in B.C. and make this information available to members.
- 4) Evaluate previous ACE training and development sessions and based on the most successful, organize more workshops in NEW community schools.
- 5) Ideally video tape these workshops and have a package available for use in outlying areas.

The 1987 Conference Committee has made contact with the North Vancouver District Superintendent and is currently waiting for a response to set up a meeting.



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
WHAT'S HAPPENING


VICTORIA

On December 3, in the library of Shoreline Community School, several community experts linked forces with the school's science teachers, Thor Henrich and Lori Gordon, to look at ways the local environment and resources could be used to enhance teaching the science curriculum.

Representatives from Ministry of the Enviornment and the Capital Regional District Parks Dept spoke on enviornmental issues and planning. A local engineer came with information on energy resources and technology; suggestions teaching astronomy were put forward by a professor from UVIC's Astronomy Dept. Another professor from the Psychological Foundations provided a number of resources on the use of computers in many community settings and contexts. A resident of our neighbourhood who has retired recently after many Victoria working FOF. years ⁻ Studies Oceanographic Centre brought insight and ideas on the topic of ocean sciences. Many other community members and professionals who were not able to attend on December 3 have indicated a keen interest in serving as resource persons on an on-going basis.

Through a structured set of activities and discussions, these community experts provided our science teachers with many ideas for guest speakers, small enrichment projects and field trips.





As Chair of the Communications and Expansions Committee of ACE/BC, Maggie Larocque proposed to the general membership at the A.G.M., that they 'support the development of a community school in Vernon B.C.'

To date she has introduced the vriaosolina of Community Education and Community Schools to two groups: the Vernon School Board and the Social Planning Council (a non-profit society with about 35 member agencies). Both of these presentations were well recieved and resulted in requests for more information concerning Community-based Curriculum. The Women's Coalition Okanagan requested a public showing of the ACE video.

As a result of Maggie's hard work, some teachers and other interested individuals have recently come together to form a committee which may well follow through with the pilot project.

Maggie hopes to meet with the Principals Association and two Parent Support Committees before the General Meeting on May 2, 1987.


