They are greeted by two YMCA staff and Linda from Golf BC to begin Jumpstart, an afterschool, multi-sport leadership program designed to get children active and participating in organized sports and recreation outside of school hours.

Once attendance is taken and snack time is over, a warm-up is done to get the children mobile and ready for the session. The participants begin by learning the biomechanics of a proper golf swing, how much force to use when swinging the club and the focus necessary to hit a target. Linda from Golf BC comments:

PRESIDENT'S REPORT—ACEBC ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING, FEBRUARY 11, 2011

How will community schools in the province be different tomorrow as a result of us meeting today? How valuable do you plan this meeting to be?

These questions from Peter Block's book, *Community – a Structure of Belonging* have guided my leadership of the board over the past year. The purpose of the board meetings is to improve the lives and vitality of children, families and community in BC, using the strategy of community schools.

When I ran for president in January last year, I had not returned to the board since I was a charter member in the 1970's. The board was healthy and consisted of people who were hard at work and committed. A great deal of credit goes to Jim Taylor, Past President who has been awarded a lifetime membership as a result of more than a decade of leadership for ACEbc. It was with great privilege that I moved into this role. My platform was to improve communication, re-connect with and provide professional development for our membership around the province. I will talk about some of the results we have accomplished together and those in progress. This work has been accomplished by the efforts of the entire board.

The work began with personal phone calls to members in all areas of the province to touch base and ask the questions:

What are you proud of?
What is the predominant emerging issue?
How can the board support your work?

Coordinators seemed thirsty for those conversations, current information and shared their successes and challenges.

Some accomplishments of ACEbc over the past year are:

- The website was improved aesthetically, functionally and with greater depth of information for members, to make it a 'go-to' place.
- The board planned and held a pre-conference event in October, for connection and conversations with coordinators, 40 coordinators attended. The agenda included a two way conversation with Kim Weatherby and Ann Garside from Cross Sector Strategic Initiatives ~ B.C. Ministry of Education about Neighbourhood Learning Centres.
- The Surrey Conference on School Community Partnerships was held with 900 people in attendance, ACEbc sponsored Abe Fernandez, presenter.
- Both events furthered the development, affirmation, potential and understanding of community schools.
- A brief was written to the Select Standing Committee on Finance.
- A board member participated in the Provincial Roundtable for Community Services on our behalf.
- Staff from the Ministry of Education, Neighbourhood Learning Centres invited ACEbc to sit at the Education Sector Engagement Table. ACEbc was awarded a contract to develop a paper on the various models of schools with community engagement in the Province. This project is complete and will become a valuable document for both the Ministry

In partnership with L'Association des Francophones de Nanaimo, staff, students of NDSS, its French Immersion & Francophone programs teamed up with Nanaimo's French cultural ancestry families, musicians, artists, dancers to celebrate French culture and community education. Food! Song! Dance! FORMIDABLE!

Once it hits the snow, the hot liquid maple syrup-sap cools; quickly hardens and creates a delicacy enjoyed as is with a spoon, or popsicle stick! Voilà! Children of all ages with a sweet tooth can savour the natural sweetness of maple taffy on snow!

The superb snow, used to crystallized the hot maple sap, was dug by volunteers, liberating it from the astounding 33 ft deep snowpack on Mount Washington. The area, within Strathcona Provincial Park forms the geologic spine of the mid-island alpine region and is easily reached by paved road.

ARROWSMITH COMMUNITY ENHANCEMENT SOCIETY (ACES) RECEIVES GRANT FOR NEW HORIZONS FOR SENIORS PROGRAM

The Arrowsmith Community Enhancement Society (ACES) serves the neighbourhoods of Errington, Coombs, Hilliers, Whiskey Creek, and Meadowood. This rural community is bordered by Parksville, Qualicum Beach, and Port Alberni and is recognized by the famous "Goats on the Roof" market in Coombs. ACES embraces the community education philosophy of working together with community partners.

Arrowsmith Community Enhancement Society has received a major grant for their New Horizons for Seniors project, "Life is a Celebration; Marimba

Music for Seniors". The project is an ACES initiative in collaboration with the Mid-Island Pensioners & Hobbyists Association (Bradley Centre), School District 69, and the youth ensemble Kumbana Marimba. The \$24,000 grant from Human Resources and Skills Development Canada allows ACES to commission the building of a set of marimbas especially designed for seniors. This set is currently under construction by Rick Palmer of Marimba Magic in Cowichan and will be ready in March for the marimba classes and the formation of a senior's performance ensemble to play at community events (continued on next page)

and our membership. April Lewis and Janey Talbot will be presenting the final report, called "Neighbourhood Learning Centres in British Columbia: *Models, Elements, and Stages of Development of Schools with Community Engagement*" on April 13, 2011 to the Engagement Table.

- A relationship with Neighbourhood Learning Centres has been developed which is one of respect for the work community schools do in the Province.
- A grant writer was appointed with the purpose of securing funds for board operations.
- Constitutional review has begun but has been put on hold for the upcoming year.
- The board was kept up to date on current issues:
 - BCRPA report: Addressing the After School Hours
 - The Emerging Plan for an Integrated System of Early Care and Learning in BC
 - The review of CommunityLINKS and the logic model that is being developed, 2 members of the board sit at that table
- Directors and Officers Insurance continues to grow and the life time members list has been updated.
- An Action plan to promote community education in the province is underway.
- A coordinators retreat in Sooke, at Edward Milne Community School is in the planning stages for the Fall.

I would like to single out Don Reimer who has spearheaded and written the majority of the document for the Neighbourhood Learning Centres staff in the Ministry. Don is now off in Africa and I want to acknowledge the contributions he is making on a local level for ACEbc, and also globally.

In closing I'd like to thank the entire board for their creativity and effort, everything accomplished has truly been teamwork.

and celebrations. The lessons will take place at Bradley Centre where the instruments will be housed. The grant will also enable the construction of a second set of marimbas for use throughout District 69 and Marimba Magic will provide a set of templates for the construction of the second set of instruments. Starting in January, these marimbas will be built at Qualicum Beach Middle School under the supervision of Woodwork teacher David Haynes. A group of seniors will work in the woodwork shop for up to 14 weekly sessions to construct the instruments: three sopranos, two tenors, a baritone, and a bass. The instruments will be "unveiled" at a celebration in June.

WALK/RUN FOR SUCCESS AND SUPPORT WACSS



The West Abbotsford Community School Society (WACSS) is hosting the first annual West Abbotsford Walk/Run for Success on April 30th, 2011 starting at 10am. The Walk/Run for Success is a 2km walk, 5km (1 lap of route) run or 10km (2 lap) run taking place at Rotary Stadium and Discovery Trail.

By participating in the West Abbotsford Walk/Run for Success fundraising event, you are helping us provide children and families with the opportunity for success by supporting subsidies towards programming, equipment and supplies, and dollars towards staffing in order to allow for free and low cost programs. All participants who raise \$25 in donations are eligible for a t-shirt.

Any donation over \$15 can be given a charitable tax receipt for the specified donors name. 10% of all donations raised by the aforementioned, involved schools will be given back to the individual schools to provide for their needs, whether it be equipment and supplies or subsidies to programs they offer. Incentives are in place for all students and race participants as follows: top primary, intermediate, middle, and secondary students for donations (male and female) will receive a prize in all schools; top class at each elementary school will receive a healthy classroom party prize; top school donation amount will also receive a prize. Individual donation prizes are in place for the following amounts: \$50, \$100, and \$500+. There will be prizes for the runners who come in first for the 5km and 10km run in the following age categories, both male and female: primary (K-3), intermediate (4-5), middle (6-8), high (9-12), adult (18-54 years), and senior (55+ years).

watched and can play to their best ability, which in turn will help them with self esteem. Golf in Jumpstart helps these kids grow by showing them the sprit of the game and introducing them to sports at a young age."

Later that week, the same participants will participate in Sportball and play a non-competitive sport with coach Sheldon. Coach Sheldon focuses on instilling and encouraging confidence, self-esteem and teamwork when working with the group. The YMCA staff have noticed great improvements in the skill and ability of the participants since the program began last October. YMCA supervisor Jennifer Danyluck observed:

"This program has enabled kids to develop better teamwork and social skills. Furthermore, the kids have improved coordination, more control over their movements, and enhanced self-awareness. They have really come a long way since the program started; they have much more energy and enthusiasm." One major success Jennifer noted is that "We hear 'I can't' less often than we used to."

Jumpstart began as an initiative of the Surrey School District and was developed in response to an identified need in schools and in the greater community. With a large number of vulnerable students, many of whom do not have opportunities to participate in organized sport and recreation, the District recognized a gap and took action. With

the support and generosity of the Ministry of Community, Culture and Sport, Canadian Tire and partnerships with the YMCA, Sportball, and numerous Provincial Sport Organizations, the idea for this program was finally actualized into reality.

The program includes Run, Jump, Throw curricula and Right to Play activities which are used by staff to develop fundamental movement skills, sport basics, leadership, and social responsibility. In addition to coaches and YMCA staff, there are high school volunteers who earn course credits and volunteer hours to mentor the participants. What remains most important is that the program engages children in developing skills, sport basics, leadership, and social responsibility while being active and having a fun. As put by Martin, a participant in grade 3 at Lena Shaw:"I never played golf before but I can now...it's so much fun."

Jumpstart Academy launched in 10 schools across the Surrey School District in 2010 and has since grown to include 23 inner-city elementary schools. This year more than 1,000 children will participate in the program, which runs to the end of the school year and is cost-free to participating children.


